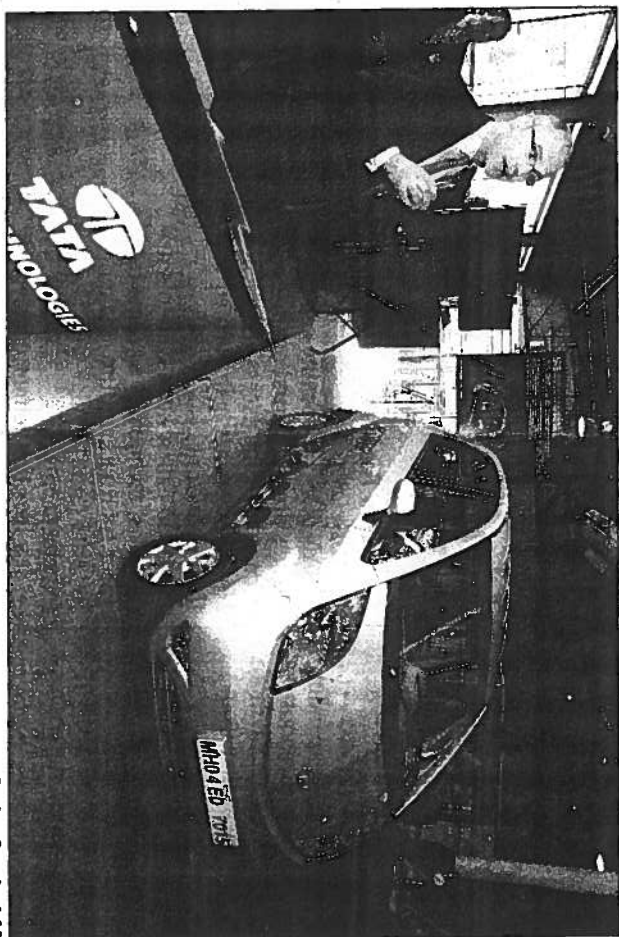

Tata Nano car from India could cost \$8,000 in U.S.

DETROIT — The world's cheapest car is being readied for sale in the U.S., but by the time India's Tata Nano is retrofitted to meet emissions and safety standards, it won't be that cheap.

Tata Technologies Ltd., the global engineering arm of the Tata group conglomerate, brought the tiny car

privately that the U.S. version is expected to have a comparable price. The official did not want to be

the car's two-cylinder, 623 cc engine would have to be engineered to meet stronger U.S. pollution standards, he said. Air bags would have to be added, the roof strengthened and the front bumper lengthened to meet U.S. requirements to limit damage in a 5-mph crash.
